


This program is your chance to embark on an inspiring international journey, foster a deep understanding of global sustainability challenges and the boundless opportunities that await.





Additional information	Located right in Ghent's city centre, KaBa Hostel features a garden with a terrace and offers rooms with free WiFi 1 km from the Vrijdagmarkt Square and Ghent's City Council. Public parking is possible near the accommodation for a charge.	
	Dormitory rooms at KaBa Hostel come with lockers and shared bathroom facilities. Some rooms also feature a TV and a private bathroom. Guests have access to the property's garden with a terrace.	
	There is a shared kitchen accessible to all guests that includes an oven, a stove, a microwave, a dishwasher, a fridge and a coffee machine. A dining area is also available for guests.	
	Many supermarkets and eating facilities are available in the vicinity of the hostel. The centra Korenmarkt Square is a 5-minute bicycle ride away and the Koning Albert Park is 10 minutes' walk away. Gent-Sint-Pieters Train Station is 3 km from the accommodation and offers connections to al major Belgian cities.
